CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF EXCELLENCE

Henry Ford Health System hit triple digits this year, celebrating its 100th birthday. The Baldrige award-winning Henry Ford Health System started with automotive icon Henry Ford, who opened the 48-

bed Henry Ford Hospital in 1915. We've marked the centennial throughout the system this year with a number of celebrations for our physicians and staff, culminating with the Jubilee Reunion and Gala held this past October. Almost eight-

One of the highlights of the Reunion was the chance to visit the Detroit Historical Museum, which marked our anniversary with a special exhibit exploring the system's 10 decades of history. Besides tracking the growth of the system the exhibit also notes some clinical milestones, including the

HENRY FORD HEALTH SYSTEM'S FIRST 100 YEARS A trip through time

- 1910's The first patient with a documented medical record at Henry Ford Hospital was seen on July 13, 1915.
- 1920's The Henry Ford Hospital School of Nursing and Hygiene opened in 1925. Students accepted into the tuitionfree school lived free-of-charge at the Clara Ford Nurses Home.
- **1930's** In 1939 Surgeon-in-Chief Dr. Roy McClure developed the innovative practice of adding iodine to kitchen salt in order to prevent the development of thyroid-related goiters.
- 1940's Dr. Conrad Lam and then-resident Dr. Edward Quinn administered penicillin to 40 patients at Henry Ford Hospital as part of the national clinical trial to find a new drug to treat infections.
- 1950's Dr. James T. Barron partnered with the medical and engineering staff of the Chrysler Corporation in the design of the Barron Food Pump, which led to a reduction of patient deaths due to ulcerative colitis.
- 1960's Dr. Boy Frame of Internal Medicine started the Bone & Mineral Disorders Clinic. His research team became internationally known for identifying osteoporosis and its treatment.
- 1970's The seven-story Benson Ford Education & Research Center was built so physician-researchers could work closely with laboratory research scientists. The building opened in 1977 with a dedication by President Gerald Ford.
- **1980's** Drs. Fred Whitehouse and Dorothy Kahkonen were the second in the country to administer human insulin to a patient with diabetes.
- 1990's The first successful transplant of the Acorn CorCap Cardiac Support Device was conducted at Henry Ford Hospital by cardiothoracic surgeon Dr. Robert Brewer.
- 2000's Cancer surgeon, Dr. S. David Nathanson, pioneered the use of sentinel node biopsy to detect the spread of breast cancer to the lymph nodes.
- 2010's Henry Ford Hospital/Henry Ford Health System becomes the only organization in the U.S. to win all five major health care quality awards: Foster G. McGaw Prize (2004); Joint Commission Ernest Amory Codman Award (2006); American Hospital Association's McKesson Quest for Quality Prize (2010); Joint Commission's John M. Eisenberg Award (2011); Malcolm Baldrige Award in 2011.

The Jubilee began with an opening reception at the Detroit Historical Museum where guests had the opportunity to tour the special exhibit, "Henry Ford Health System: 100 Years Measured in Life," in addition to the museum's permanent collection.



The Allesee Gallery of Culture at the DHM allows visitors to explore the people and places that are "distinctly Detroit" - and was a perfect place for friends, and colleagues like Barbara Tilley, Ph.D. and Howard Duncan, M.D. to begin the weekend's festivities.





CEO Nancy Schlichting was in attendance, accompanying alumni and guests on tours of the HFHS special exhibit. During her tenure Ms. Schlichting has built an impressive legacy; she is credited with improving operations and market reach, helping Henry Ford win the 2011 Malcolm Baldridge National Quality Award, and opened the Henry Ford West Bloomfield Hospital in 2009.



HENRY FORD HEALTH SYSTEM LAUNCHES ALUMNI PROGRAM


Now in its fourth year,


SandCastles

DR. RIVAL RETIRES AFTER 46 YEARS OF SERVICE

This past summer Henry Ford Health System recognized Dr. Jan Rival's 46 years of distinguished service in the Department of Medicine. Respected by his peers, admired by his students,

and beloved by his patients Jan was celebrated at a reception held Wednesday, June 17.

Jan was raised and educated in Czechoslovakia and earned his medical degree, summa cum laude, from Koemnski University in Bratislava. He completed a fellowship in cardiology at Philadelphia General Hospital and the Wayne State University School of Medicine.

Dr. Rival joined Henry Ford Hospital in 1969 and was a division head in the Department of Internal Medicine from 1985 to 1996. He served as president of the Henry Ford medical Association from 2000 to 2007 and was the recipient of the Fred W. Whitehouse M, MD Distinguished Career Award in 2008, which recognized his exemplary service and

record of excellence that epitomizes the mission of the Henry Ford Medical Group.

In addition to his accomplishments at Henry Ford, Dr. Rival served as governor of the Michigan Chapter of the America College of Physicians (ACP) which presented him with its Laureate Award and Lifetime

Achievement Award. In 2015 the ACP elevated him to Mastership, the highest honor bestowed upon a member of the College. He is also a fellow in the American College of Cardiology, and is the author or co-0author of more than 40 publications and abstracts.

Jan's contributions to the system and to the field of medicine extend beyond his own career through his work as an educator, teaching and leading countless students and future physicians. For many years Dr. Rival was a clinical Associate Professor of medicine at the University of Michigan, where he received its Outstanding Teacher Award in 1994. His students and patients honored him by creating a traveling scholarship award in his name. This award is presented annually to an exceptional resident within the Department of Internal Medicine. In addition, the Henry Ford Health System presents the Jan Rival Outstanding Resident Award on an annual basis to a physician-in-training selected from all of the System's residents.

Henry Ford Health System is honored and humbled to have had such a distinguished and respected physician as part of our family, and look forward to his continued involvement and service as a member of the Alumni Association, the education of our physicians in training, and an annual Grand Rounds event.

Carlisle K. Parker, Jr., M.D.

Carlisle K. Parker, Jr. M.D., Otolaryngology resident from 1957 to 1961 and Medical Group physician from 1963-65 at Henry Ford Hospital passed away April 5, 2015 at the age of 84. Dr. Parker entered the United States Air Force in 1961 and was stationed in Wichita Falls, Texas for two years before returning to Henry Ford and was on the junior staff. In 1965 he opened a private practice in Toledo, Ohio where he continued to practice until his retirement in 1996.
