# Sew Up the Safety Net for Women & Children

## **Clinician Fact Sheet**

### **Program Basics**

- Linking women to needed medical and social resources to prevent poor birth outcomes and address
   Detroit's high infant mortality rate
- 1,500 underserved or at-risk women (375 pregnant + 1,125 non-pregnant) from the Detroit neighborhoods of Brightmoor (48223), Chadsey-Condon (48208, 48210), and Osborn (48205, 48234)
- Sew Up the Safety Net facilitates coordination among existing community and clinical programs
- Enrollment begins March 2012
- A partnership of Detroit's major health systems and more than 30 community and academic, and public health partners\*
  - o Participating health systems include: Detroit Medical Center, Henry Ford Health System, Oakwood Healthcare System, St. John Providence Health System
  - Participating public health departments include: Detroit Department of Health and Wellness
     Promotion, Wayne County Health Department and the Michigan Department of Community Health

### How does the program work?

Community health workers called Community & Neighborhood Navigators (CNNs) – on staff at *Sew Up the Safety Net* – are uniquely trained to help women navigate clinical, social and economic challenges. Their services are FREE to the women who participate in the program.

#### The CNN:

- Works with program participants to develop an individualized healthy-living plan
- Visits pregnant women at home to support and guide them through their infant's first birthday
- May accompany women to their prenatal or pediatric visits
- Connects women with health care providers, community organizations, and other resources (such as transportation, workforce development, access to healthy food, safe places to be physically active and financial literacy)

#### **Resources provided:**

- United Way 2-1-1: A telephone and web-based community resource guide to over 30,000 services in southeast Michigan
- Health Education: The Text4baby service sends health education text messages to participants cell
  phones. This program is found to increase preconception and prenatal health knowledge and link
  women to resources
- Support: Sew Up the Safety Net provides group sessions for both pregnant and non-pregnant participants in their own neighborhoods
- Bright Futures for Women: This American Academy of Pediatrics program addresses the physical and emotional needs of women with at least one child who may become pregnant again
