

DONOR HIGHLIGHT

We are grateful for the Edward T. and Ellen K. Dryer Charitable Foundation

Lifelong Detroit residents, Edward and Ellen Dryer founded the Edward T. and Ellen K. Dryer Charitable Foundation to help children and adults in Michigan who are affected by blindness or visual impairment. The Dryers experienced the impact of vision loss firsthand when Edward took a business trip to New York for Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit and suddenly lost his sight. At the time, there were no medical treatments for Edward to pursue and he lost his job as a result.

A pioneer in the field of advertising, Ellen became the first female Media Director for the Doner Company (formerly the W.B. Doner & Company). When she came home at night, she would read the Wall Street Journal to Edward, who then found success investing in the stock market. Edward also advocated for publicly traded companies to release their annual reports as audio tapes so that those with blindness or vision impairment could listen to them. "I lost my sight, but never my vision," Edward frequently said.

This vision combined with a passion for improving their community led Edward and Ellen to found the Dryer Foundation. Since then, the Foundation has given more than four million dollars to causes that

benefit those who are blind or visually impaired in Michigan. Over the past 11 years, the Dryer Foundation has given over \$135,000 to the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology Transportation Fund.

"The Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology's support groups offer a valuable opportunity to connect with others who have experienced vision loss," Dryer Foundation Trustee Jon Gandelot said. "No one should be excluded from this opportunity because they don't have access to transportation. Edward and Ellen Dryer would have been pleased to see the impact their Foundation has had at the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology, as well as throughout the state of Michigan."


TEAM MEMBER PROFILES

Kim enjoys working with Dr. Everett and shares his passion of refractive cataract surgery. With the introduction of new technologies, Kim sees more patients achieving maximized visual outcomes. She hopes more doctors continue to integrate technology into their practice to give their patients the best care available. Kim notes, “nowadays, most patients demand it!”



Allan Rinke, M.D. Dr. Allan Rinke never considered a career as a medical doctor growing up. He enjoyed playing sports including soccer, baseball and basketball, was involved in 4-H and held a state horse racing record. In high school, he wanted to be a finished carpenter when he graduated. While attending college, he considered becoming an engineer. Since there were no doctors in his family, he never considered medicine as a possible career. However, while in college, Dr. Rinke achieved good grades and enjoyed learning about how the body works. He started doing research with Dr. Frank Giblin in the Eye Research Institute at Oakland University and that is when his interest in ophthalmology began. He dissected lenses out of mice eyes, performed cell cultures, auto radiography, western blots and worked with transgenic mice. This became his introduction into the field of ophthalmology and a future career.

Dr. Rinke attended Wayne State Medical School and did his residency at Kresge Eye Institute in Detroit, Michigan. Dr. Rinke always wanted to live on a lake in a small town so he took a job in Alpena, Michigan after his residency. Alpena is where he met his wife and had three wonderful children. After seven years of working and raising a family in Alpena, Dr. Rinke decided to move closer to home and took a job with Kresge Eye Institute. He spent the next five years with Kresge, fine tuning his skills. In early 2019, Dr. Rinke joined the Henry Ford Medical Group and the Ophthalmology department. Dr. Rinke is currently a comprehensive ophthalmologist working at the Henry Ford Lake Orion and Lakeside locations.

Kim Jebodhsingh, M.D.

Henry Ford Health System alumnus Kim Jebodhsingh was born in Barbados and attended Harrison College. She received her Bachelor of Science Degree at the University of Waterloo, Ontario, Canada and her Master of Science degree at the University of the West Indies.

Dr. Jebodhsingh completed her ophthalmology residency at Henry Ford Hospital where she trained in general ophthalmology. She then completed a two-year American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons (A.S.O.R.P.S.) fellowship in Eyelid, Reconstructive, Lacrimal and Orbital surgery at the University of Toronto.

In 2009, Dr. Jebodhsingh returned to Barbados to start the Oculoplastic service at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital (QEH) and at a private practice, the Eye Clinic. At this time, she also started the “Latest Updates in Ophthalmology Sub-specialty Conference.” This conference, now in its 10th year, brings speakers from around the world to Barbados.


Because there is a great need for research in the Caribbean, Dr. Jebodhsingh co-founded the Caribbean Ophthalmology Research Alliance (CORA). CORA is a registered charity that raises funds for research into eye diseases that affect Caribbean people. They host an annual tea party to raise funds and have started research training classes for their residents with these funds. In the future, they hope to raise funds for research grants.

Dr. Jebodhsingh is also Vice President of the Ophthalmology Society of the West Indies (OSWI), Director of Research at the QEH and President of the Barbados Squash Association. She enjoys working with patients from all walks of life, as well as ages, and finds being an administrator the most challenging part of her job.

Without a doubt, Dr. Jebodhsingh feels her training at Henry Ford Hospital set the foundation for her career and allowed her to pursue many other interests in an “effort to help with education and research in the Caribbean.” For that, she is truly grateful.



RESEARCH

Daniel Rathbun, Ph.D. is a research scientist at Henry Ford, leading the Bionics and Vision Laboratory. He studies the language that the eye speaks to the brain to improve prosthetic vision devices. Such devices restore sight to patients blinded by retinal degenerations such as retinitis pigmentosa and macular degeneration.



Daniel Rathbun, Ph.D.

Dr. Rathbun received degrees in Neuroscience from the University of Texas at Dallas and the University of California, Davis. He studied bionic vision for a decade in Germany under Professor Eberhart Zrenner, a legend in the field. There, he founded the Experimental Retinal Prosthetics Group at the University Eye Clinic of Tuebingen. In late 2018, Dr. Rathbun moved to Detroit to create the Bionics and Vision lab at Henry Ford.

Dr. Rathbun's research applies the study of neural coding in the visual system to: 1) understanding how images are processed in the healthy and degenerating retina; 2) understanding how the retina responds to electrical stimulation; and 3) using this knowledge to advance bionic vision. At Henry Ford, he is establishing the world's first electrophysiology laboratory dedicated to working with human retinal tissue freshly donated by ophthalmology patients.








